Dear University of Arkansas Member,

In an effort to provide appropriate, affordable health care options while managing drug costs, the University of Arkansas prescription drug plan will move ALOGLIPTIN to 100% copay status effective May 1 2018. As a result, you may see your copay increase. We suggest you speak with your physician about lower-cost alternatives (including over-the-counter) and the therapy most appropriate for your care

The above change to your prescription drug plan is directed by the University of Arkansas Pharmacy Advisory Committee, who strive to maintain affordable and appropriate healthcare benefits. The review of the DPP-4 inhibitor drug class (including Januvia, Janumet, Nesina, Oseno, Tradjenta, Jentadueto, Onglyza, Kombiglyze, and other combinations containing DPP4 inhibitors) showed the drugs provide no beneficial clinical outcomes compared to placebo. Although the drugs decrease hemoglobin A1C by a small amount, other drugs used to treat type 2 diabetes mellitus have shown to reduce the disease-related endpoints in type 2 diabetic patients. Please see your doctor to find which drug that has been shown to reduce cardiovascular disease and mortality is best for you. Alternatives include metformin, liraglutide (Victoza), empagliflozin (Jardiance) in some cases, and insulin.
